Rapid Survey to Assess Remote Learning at the School level in India during Covid-19



What did we learn from 11,200+ students and their parents/teachers about remote learning during COVID-19 in India?

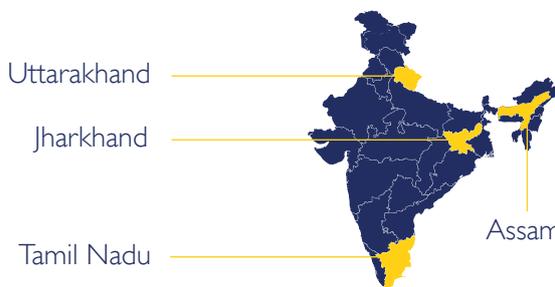
The study titled “Rapid Survey to Assess Remote Learning at the School level in India during Covid-19” was conducted in Sep-Dec 2020 by Outline India with due support from the Asian Development Bank. The aim was to understand the challenges specifically related to ICT-based learning tools and associated requirements, and the learning environment at home.

The Outline India team interacted with more than 11,200 students and their parents/interviews across four states in India via phone interviews.

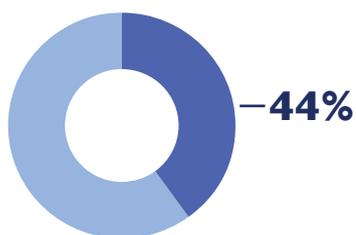
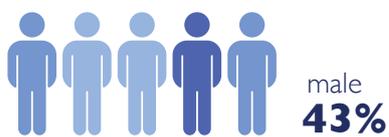
Here we share a glimpse of the on ground scenario and our insights based on the data collected.

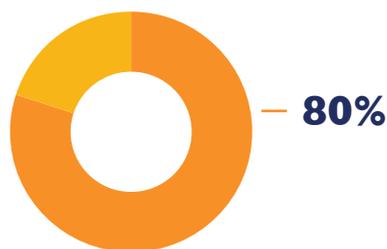

The data depicted that 43.5% of the students interviewed were male and 56.5% students were female.



44% report that the father is primarily engaged in daily wage-earning activities



80% report that mothers are housewives.

Remote learning services during COVID-19

It was also reported in most cases that attendance was initially very low at the onset of online classes, but over time this figure has only increased

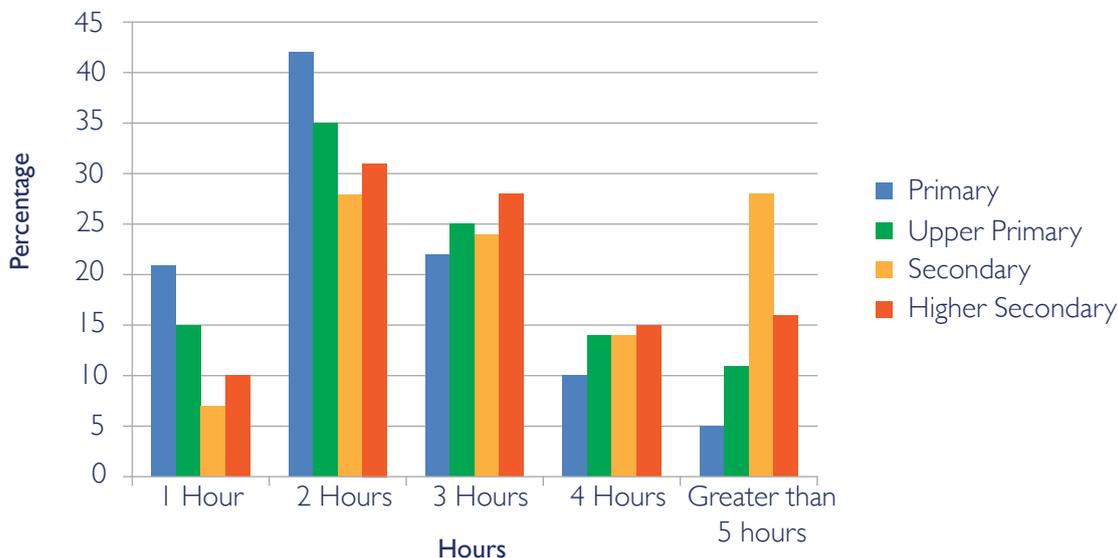

of the students use YouTube as the most common medium for remote learning

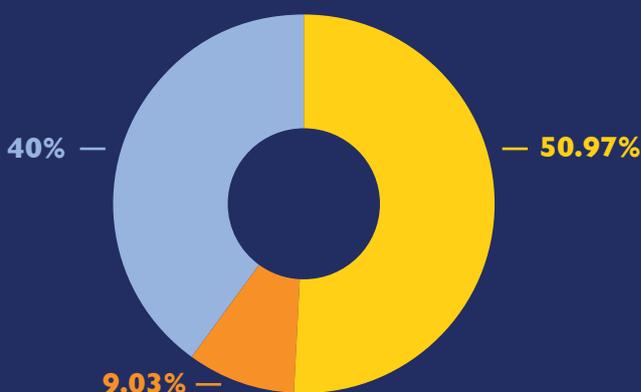
WhatsApp **31%**

The teachers primarily used WhatsApp groups to carry out the teaching-learning process



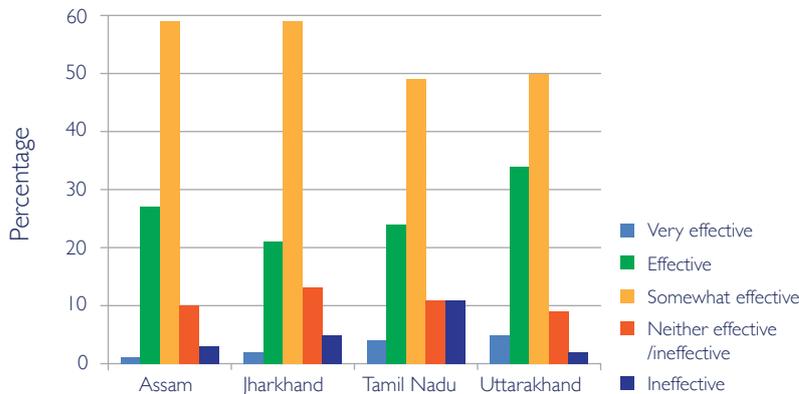
Mode of communication from school administration/teachers' regarding online learning

- Through teacher

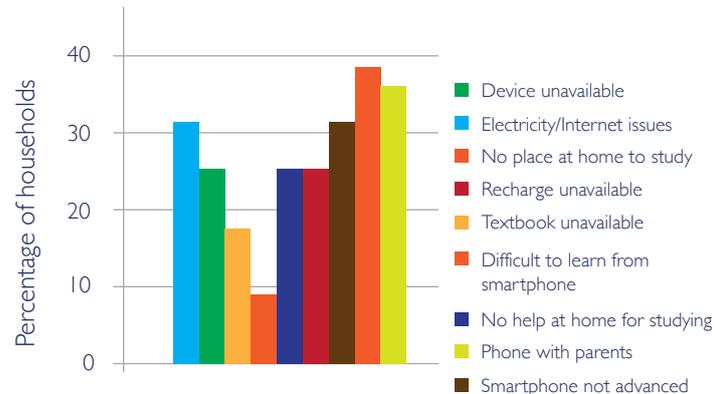
Perceptions towards remote/ online learning

Recommendations

- Recording of sessions for convenience of students.
- Usage of a combination of Smartphones and TV for remote learning.
- School devising a strong monitoring and feedback system for fruitful remote learning.
- Capacity building programmes for teachers.
- Multiple medium for administering remote learning.

Attendance in Remote Learning Increasing

"...In offline learning almost 60-80% of the enrolled students attended classes but now the attendance is dependent on the guardians. Students can log in for the classes only when their parents allow them to use the smartphone...."
